

Flower, Food and Foto Show

Calling all members and their friends to action, the time is coming soon to gather in all of those award winning flowers and vegetables to exhibit at our Flower, Food and Foto (FFF) Show. We hope all club members will consider bringing a few of their favorite flowers, vegetables and floral designs to the show.

If you have not exhibited at the show before, never fear - experienced exhibitors will be on hand to help you!

Go to our website (www.MWGCM.org) and hit "Links" where you will find the show schedule with rules, entry classes and an example of how to fill out an entry tag. (If you do not have access to the internet, give Judy Berglund a call at 952-975-1960 and she will send you a paper copy of the show schedule.)



Our featured flower is Zinnias, which may be exhibited as 3 uniform blooms of one variety for small blooms that are less than 2 inches or as 1 bloom for medium and large sizes 2.5 inches and up. Zinnias may also be exhibited as container grown plants.

Beans are this year's featured vegetable, bush or pole, in green, yellow or purple. For exhibit, do not trim stem or end of pods. There should be 7 pods uniform in size, color and quality.



Please do not forget to bring your "FARM THEME" floral designs.

Directions for the August 5 Tour

Caution: This is Minnesota's other season: road construction. I drove this route on July 20 and there were no detours or closures, but be alert to changes.

1. Find Bob Olson's house on your own at 2840 Glenhurst Avenue South, St. Louis Park. (Glenhurst is one block west of France Ave. 2840 is 1 ½ blocks north of Minnetonka Blvd.)
2. From Bob's house, go north half a block to 28th Avenue Street or south half a block to Sunset Boulevard.
3. Turn right at 28th Street or left at Sunset Boulevard go one block to France Avenue South. Turn right on France.
4. Go to the stop light and turn right on to Minnetonka Blvd, but be prepared to bear left almost immediately on to Hennepin County 25 (formerly MN Highway 7).
5. At the first stop light turn left on to Belt Line Boulevard.
6. Belt Line Boulevard will end at a T with West 36th Street. Turn left and follow W 36th Street to Excelsior Boulevard.
7. Turn right on Excelsior Boulevard. Go to the second stop light (Quentin Avenue) and turn left. Follow Quentin Ave until it intersects with Wooddale Avenue South.
8. Turn left on to Wooddale and follow it to West 44th Street.
9. Turn right on 44th Street. Go one block and turn right on to Dart Avenue South.
10. Mary's house is on the right about half way up the block: 4375 Dart Avenue South. (Brick house with white pergola). Parking is allowed on both sides of Dart Ave, on the north side of 44th Street west of Dart Ave or on the west side of Wooddale Ave.

Bonus: notice all the beautiful boulevard gardens along Mary's block.

Wednesday, July 9, was a bright, sunny day at the Lyndale Park Gardens, and that was ideal. Four members of the MWGCM met with 20 students from Minneapolis Public Schools who were spending a week earning graduation credits by learning about work in the "green" industry. They spent time with the National Forest Service, Wilderness Inquiry, and Wednesday with Minneapolis Park Board employees -- and an hour with us -- learning about and trying out work in those areas.



In this photo, new member James Empson is giving the students an outline of what plants need to thrive. Kay Wolfe introduced the MWGCM and our role in the gardens, and Kirky Otto outlined their task: take the information they'd gotten from James, divide into groups, and follow the above mentioned, Steve Shubick, or one of the MPRB staff gardeners to a spot in the garden. There each group critiqued what was planted in "their" section (James's idea), came up with suggestions for changes, and put together a verbal report on their ideas, which they had to defend. Steve was happy to challenge ideas, and the kids got a kick out of explaining themselves.

The kids did a great job, and had some fun ideas (although we will probably not replace a mid-sized Norway pine with a giant cottonwood tree, as one group suggested), and got a bit of experience with designing, as opposed to physical labor. Everyone, students and adults, seemed to have a good time, and to come away with positive responses. It's entirely possible that some of those kids will wind up as MWGCM members, given 10 or 20 years of gardening. They all have a bit of ownership in the Trial Gardens now.

Getting to Know Your Board Member: Alan Gallaher

As the King of Hearts advised Alice: "Begin at the beginning," the King said, very gravely, "and go on till you come to the end: then stop.", so shall I.

I was born and grew up in Appleton, WI, went to college in Madison and then moved to Minneapolis to do my master's degree at the University. After working for a few years in St Paul, I moved to Evanston, IL to get one more degree. As I'd been educated and trained as a speech-language pathologist, I worked in hospitals, rehab centers, and universities. I lived and worked in the Toledo, OH, region as well as State College, PA, but ended up in Eau Claire,

WI, teaching at the University there. After retiring, I decided that there wasn't a whole lot to do in Eau Claire, so I moved to Edina and here I am.

My father grew up on a farm before WWI and as a consequence had no use for farming or for yard work. My mother, on the other hand, loved gardening raising flowers and some vegetables, so at a young age, I was drafted to assist in the garden duties. For much of my early working years, I lived in apartments with no possibility of outside gardening but always raised houseplants, some getting to monstrous proportions. The *ficus benjamina* I bought at the supermarket in 1980 as a two foot sapling is still with me but now I have to trim it down from the ceiling. When I bought my first and second houses, I plunged into landscaping and establishing flower gardens. I tried my hand at vegetables but I wasn't very good: things kept happening like getting the insect spray confused with Round-Up.

In 2009 I bought my townhouse in Edina and decided my days of gardening were over. When I moved, I got rid of all of my gardening tools. A few years later, the resident who had been managing the townhouse grounds wasn't able to continue and I volunteered, and as I was the only volunteer, I got it. Soon afterward, Mary Oelke and Audrey Grote, my neighbors, suggested I come along with them to a monthly meeting of the MWGCM. The MWGCM seem to fit the bill for me perfectly. I needed contacts in the gardening world to keep me up-to-date and to give me ideas for our grounds.

With 6 acres of land to manage, it certainly has kept me busy. Slowly the number of garden tools in my garage has grown and grown. My knowledge of tree diseases like oak wilt and emerald ash borer management as well as what flowers deer will and won't eat has also grown steadily in the last 3 years. Through our club last year I was able to explore my interest in flower arranging and entered the FFF Show. I was pleased to make a respectable first showing and am already planning my entries for this year's show. Last November I got a call asking me to run to the Board. I was reluctant as I still feel like the new kid on the block but decided I'd give it a try. Joining the Board has been a good experience for me, getting to know the other Board members and to understand better the challenges we face in trying to grow and to offer great experiences every year for our membership. So I guess I'm at the end of my tale. I'm very pleased that I got connected to the MWGCM at point in my life that I really needed that contact.
